General comments

Wrawby is an attractive village, with many good features and good community planting which enhances the local environment. The village is commendably free of litter.

There is good planting at the entrance to the village on Melton Road, near the very attractive village sign. Good community planting was found at the end of Kettleby Lane and at the junction of Vicarage Road and Melton Road. There was a range of planting on the island at the junction of Little Lane and Vicarage Road, where there are planters and a bench and more planters opposite on Vicarage Avenue. There was further colourful planting on Tunnel Road, at Highfield Lane and on Brigg Road at the entrance to the village from the west. Miller's Restaurant on Brigg Road also had some attractive planters.

There are many attractive gardens throughout the village, with residents significantly contributing to enhancing the local environment. There were particularly good examples of colourful planting displays at the front of properties on Melton Road and Mill View Gardens. Further good examples were found at Hawthorn House on Barton Road, Curzon on Mill Lane, along Kettleby Lane, especially number 17 and at numbers 7, 19 and 59 and outside the bungalows on Vicarage Avenue.

The village also boasts a most attractive post mill which is open to the public. The Village Hall is also a good size and has two colourful planters at the entrance. The playing field behind is well-maintained and to one side is the playground. The parish church occupies a pleasant and well-maintained site.
