No loose material shall be placed on the new driveway within 10 metres of the adopted highway unless measures are taken, in accordance with details to be submitted to and approved in writing by the local planning authority, to prevent the material from spilling onto the highway. Once agreed and implemented these measures shall be retained.

### Reason

In the interests of highway safety and to comply with policy T2 of the North Lincolnshire Local Plan.

Protective fencing shall be erected at the edge of the root protection area of the ash tree for the duration of development and no plant, materials, or machinery is permitted within this area.

## Reason

To protect the tree in accordance with policy LP12 of the North Lincolnshire Local Plan.

- If this is a decision on a planning application relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as is already the subject of an enforcement notice and if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of this notice.
- If an enforcement notice is served relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as in your application and if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of service of the enforcement notice, or within 6 months [12 weeks in the case of a householder appeal] of the date of this notice, whichever period expires earlier

### **Purchase Notices**

- If either the local planning authority or the Secretary of State refuses permission to develop land or grants it
